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President's Message

Regarding the Oregon APWA Chapter, the Board has continued to work on your behalf. Earlier this month, the chapter's 2019/2020 finances were audited by a committee including Gregg Weston (3J Consulting), Shannon Williams (Keller Associates Inc.), and Tim Blackwood (Pali Consulting, Inc.). The committee found that the Chapter's financial records were in good order, and they credited Maggie Vohs (Cameo Management Solutions), Tony Roos (2019 Chapter Treasurer) and John Lewis (2020 Chapter Treasurer) for their attention to detail and care in handling the Chapter's finances.

At our July 10th meeting, the Board reviewed and approved the Chapter's 2020/2021 budget. While the last minute cancellations of the spring events had a significant impact on the Chapter's finances, I am happy to report that the Chapter remains on solid financial ground. We are starting the budget year with approximately \$85,000 in the Chapter bank accounts, and the board is committed to ensuring that the Chapter remains financially stable moving forward....

Unfortunately, I must also report that at our July 10th meeting the Board determined that we are unable to hold our planned inperson events in Pendleton (Fall Conference) and Hood River (Street Maintenance & Collection Systems School) this fall. You may have participated in the survey regarding the events that we sent out to members in June. The results of the survey were valuable and mixed – with plenty of support for either holding or cancelling the events. Ultimately the Board's decision was heavily influenced by guidance we received from National APWA strongly recommending the cancellation of large in-person gatherings this fall.

Note that we are currently evaluating the viability of continuing with the planned Public Works Leadership and Public Works Essentials classes planned for November and December. We'll get information out to members as soon as we can once decisions are made regarding those events.

We understand that the cancellations are disappointing, and we very much appreciate the work that had already taken place planning for those events. The Chapter Education Committee and Board remain committed to providing meaningful educational opportunities to our members. To that end, we are exploring options for virtual events this fall. If you have ideas, or are interested in helping, please reach out to a Board member or to Education Committee Chair Jenifer Willer (City of Eugene).

Lastly, I encourage you to take advantage of the educational opportunities that National APWA is providing with your membership. In August, PWX@Home will be launched, and it will include over a hundred online education sessions, exhibits, and networking opportunities presented by topic throughout 2020-2021. 

The Awards Committee Recognizes Excellent People and Projects

Awards and the award submission process is an excellent way for public works leaders to engage peers, citizens, mayors, and council members. The Oregon APWA Awards Committee strives to provide a fair and transparent process for submitting and scoring nominations for Oregon APWA awards. When awards are submitted, the awards chair is responsible for conducting a high-level

completion review, organizing awards into categories, and informing the submitter of receipt. Award review and scoring is then the responsibility of the awards committee. Committee members are required to review all awards and recuse themselves in the event of a conflict of interest. The award committee is responsible for four award categories: everyday heroes, young leader, communications, and projects of the year.

The Everyday Hero program recognizes public works employees who are identified by their peers or customers for providing good customer service (responsive, consistent, courteous), making the best use of public resources (efficient, innovative), helping co-workers succeed (assistance, cooperation, solution oriented), and being a great person to work with (friendly, respectful). The Everyday Hero Award is an excellent way to show your local public works staff how important they are to the organization's success!

The Young Leader Award program recognizes and encourages young APWA members who have demonstrated an initial commitment to the profession and the association, and show potential for future growth and leadership. The award promotes the concept that length of career does not necessarily indicate leadership abilities or potential for service. Young Leader Award looks to our bright future!

Established in 2016, the Oregon Chapter Communications Award, also called the "Bulldog Award," was created in honor of the inaugural recipient: Eric "Bulldog" Jones. The award recognizes individuals who are distinguished in the public works field for communication skills or techniques that bring awareness or educate the public and/or the profession about public works or public works communications. Quality communication both internally and externally are key to the chapter's success!


Project of the Year awards are separated into four categories: transportation, environmental, structures, and disaster/emergency. Within each category are four subcategories based on total project cost. Awards are scored on a 3-point scale for construction, safety, environmental, community relationships, and unusual accomplishments. Total score of all categories is used to decide a winner. In the event of a tie, the awards chair engages the chapter president and president-elect for the deciding vote. Oregon APWA members create amazing projects every day!

The 2020 award applications are due August 15! Submit applications today!

At first glance of fleet honors, it's hard to ignore the obvious: organizations across Oregon care about their fleets. Several national programs recognize and reward peak-performing fleet operations. In 2020, two programs identified six organizations in Oregon on their lists of top fleets.

"It is an honor to be recognized as a Leading Fleet," said Salem Fleet Manager Jim Schmidt. Salem was a 2020 Top 50 fleet honored by Government Fleet Magazine. "The City of Salem Fleet Services Division has undergone extensive changes over the last two years," Schmidt said. "We have developed a great team of individuals who are passionate about their work. It is this passion that has driven the change and our performance indicators are starting to reflect these positive changes. The award is positive feedback that we are on the right track."

Six organizations in Oregon were recognized by Top 100 Fleets of the Americas 2020 rankings. The City of Eugene has made the list 13 times, and this year's #5 ranking was its highest yet. Also on the list: Washington County, Benton County, Eugene Water and Electric Board, City of Hillsboro, and City of Salem.

"This is a great honor and shows the commitment and dedication of our team," said Richard Perry, Eugene's Fleet and Radio Communications Manager. "We work hard to support our people, use effective data-driven solutions always focused on being productive, and effective, while incorporating the latest trends in the fleet industry."

While the organizations are humbled by the recognition, they recognize there is still plenty of work to do.

"The technology in new vehicles and equipment are advancing faster than we can train our technicians. Each year more software and diagnostic tools are needed to diagnose and repair vehicle issues," Schmidt said. "We have recently made investments in Ford STARS training and diagnostic software as Fords make up a third of our on-road fleet. The specialty equipment in our Fleet presents a challenge as the cost of software does not have enough ROI; for these repairs we rely on our vendors."

Virtual Luncheon goes Viral

While the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted when and how we get together, our curiosity and willingness to share will not be slowed. On July 1, the Willamette Valley Luncheon Committee held its first ever virtual luncheon.

"The Luncheons are cherished opportunities for us to get together and learn," said Brian Richardson, Committee Chair. "While we



can't safely get together in person, we still feel it's important that we can meet virtually and share many of the great projects from around the state and region."

The first luncheon was held on the virtual meeting platform Zoom. The topic, which was originally scheduled for April, was Oso – the last 45,000 years. Presenter Gunnar Schlieder, who passed away recently, provided an interpretation of the late Pleistocene and Holocene periods at the site of the deadliest landslide in U.S. history. This history was developed from surficial observations and an ambitious subsurface exploration program involving 14 drilling locations, many with dual bore-hole installations. "These innovative approaches help the chapter meet its goals, particularly in the area of training and professional development," said chapter Board Member Doug Singer. "We're working on new ways to do things that in the long run will help our chapter deliver services better and more efficiently." 


Hunter Rada, Oregon State University, Environmental Engineering, Schut Scholarship

In4All Design Thinking Program

Construction Program Assistant, ODOT The Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) has a variety of ways that it participates in its' local communities. There is one that stands above the rest. In partnership with In4All, a nonprofit organization based in Oregon, ODOT sponsors the Design Thinking and STEM Connect programs. In4All's vision is to change the narrative that tells students for whatever reason, they don't belong. Their mission is to bring local businesses and schools together to provide real-world, hands-on learning experiences that expand opportunities for students that are historically underserved, to engage in their education and aspire to careers in field they might not otherwise consider possible. In4All is mobilizing communities in creating a future of limitless possibilities. In4All programs create learning experiences that impact students at critical times in their K-12. In4All programs impacted 4,000 elementary and middle school students in the 2017-18 school year.

The Design Thinking Program problem connects with middle school students and recognizes that less than half of Oregon 8th graders pass the state math standard. With ability to pass high school algebra the first time being a predictor of high school completion, it is critical to help students connect math to life beyond. Additionally, research suggests that project-based learning increases student interest in key subjects, STEM identity and academic mindsets. Volunteers visit the classroom during math, science or STEAM electives. Dates vary to align with classroom standards, teacher preference and volunteer availability. Ideally volunteers will visit the classroom for approximately 8 sessions and the teacher works with the students before and between sessions. In4All will prepare volunteers and teachers on the Design Thinking process, program and key outcomes and objectives.

The programs key objectives focus on student academic mindsets and STEM identity. Because of the program, In4All expects to see an increase in at least one academic mindset. Data shows the four key beliefs focused on deeply influence the students' behaviors as learners and enable learning success. These mindsets affect motivation, strategy, and perseverance. The academic mindsets are:

- -I belong in this learning community.
- -I can change my abilities through effort (a growth mindset).
- -I can succeed.
- -This work has value and purpose for me.

ODOT is working with In4All in Region 1 (Portland) to run a STEM Connect program at Chief Joseph Elementary School for 4th and 5th graders. They also plan for ODOT to take on a Portland area middle school in the 2020-21 school year for Design Thinking. In Region 2, in addition to Parrish Middle School, ODOT also sponsors Four Corners Elementary and Grant Community School. In Region 4, ODOT works with La Pine Elementary and we are planning for ODOT to work with La Pine Middle School too. In Region 5, ODOT runs a STEM Connect program at Greenwood Elementary School in La Grande.

When I learned about the program, I immediately gravitated towards signing up to volunteer. I am volunteering at Parrish Middle School in Salem. My partner and I have met with our teacher and will begin our first session in a week. I was very engaged in the training and felt as though I was well prepared by my In4All representative. When we met with our teacher, they also were very well prepared and were excited for the partnership. Here in Salem, the students will have a project they've completed at the end of the 8 sessions, and we will display them at the Capitol Rotunda for all to see. My partner and I are enthusiastic about the program and the process. We are very much looking forward to experience what these students are capable of.

ODOT ADA Inspector Certification Training goes Virtual

Many organizations have had to adapt and change some business practices very quickly in light of COVID-19 restrictions. The Oregon Department of Transportation Construction Training Program in-person trainings were no exception. Due to new social distancing requirements, we cancelled all construction-related in-person trainings that were scheduled through June 30, 2020.

There was one training, however, that the construction industry told us was crucial; Americans with Disabilities Act Inspector Certification. Due to the multiple ADA projects scheduled in the 2020 construction season and with highway construction considered an essential service, we moved quickly to offer an alternative to classroom training.

ADA Inspector Certification training curriculum has changed considerably over the last year. People who attended certification classes before the end of 2019 no longer had a valid certification. The revamped ADA Certification training began in January with students attending a five hour in-person introductory day, followed by a field training day and finally passing a two hour exam with a score of 80% or higher.


Because ODOT requires all personnel who construct ADA curb ramps and perform ADA inspections to be certified, we knew we had to come up with a solution to replace classroom training. We contracted with HDR to develop a webinar to deliver the classroom part of the Introduction to ADA training virtually.

Students could register through the state's training website, iLearn, and once we received confirmation that they completed the webinar, we provided a short tem ADA certification. ODOT certified 606 people since January, with 273 of them being certified through the webinar.

Several other ODOT units have begun to explore opportunities to deliver virtual training statewide. For example, ODOT's Engineering Automation unit created videos to share updated information for their Survey Fundamental's class and the Quality Assurance unit is looking into adding eLearning as an ongoing option for certification training. The ODOT Construction Training Program is exploring various platforms such as Articulate, Rise and Storyline to create virtual trainings.

Transforming training from a classroom to a virtual experience takes research, expertise and time. We will not be eliminating in-person training, but rather offering more options for virtual training to increase the accessibility for our valued stakeholders. We are aiming to offer a few virtual courses in the 2021-2022 training season. Be sure to check out our website for more information.

Two Awards—One Chapter

Eugene Public Works Earns National Sustainability Award

The American Public Works Association (APWA) has recognized Eugene's sustainability efforts as one of the nation's best. In April, APWA awarded Eugene Public Works with an Exceptional Performance in Sustainability award for the City's work to incorporate climate change goals and greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions tracking into the City's Capital Improvement Program (CIP).

"I'm excited and honored that Eugene has received the Exceptional Performance in Sustainability award from APWA. It is a testament to the innovative work our team and community are undertaking together to meet our climate recovery goals," said Matt Rodrigues, acting Public Works Director. "The process to incorporate climate recovery goals and GHG tracking in Eugene's CIP required a significant investment in process development, training and staff time."

In 2017, the City's budget committee directed staff to incorporate the climate recovery goals and GHG tracking into the CIP. The CIP lists the capital projects funded over a six-year period. This plan, updated every two years, includes airport, parks and open space, public buildings and facilities, stormwater, transportation and wastewater projects. The current CIP, FY20 - FY25, included the estimated greenhouse gas emissions associated with each project.

"The most beneficial outcomes of the process were greatly expanding organization knowledge of tools and methods for estimating greenhouse gas emissions for CIP projects and developing a shared understanding of how our project and material choices influence progress toward our climate recovery goals," said Rodrigues.

The award follows an article by Rodrigues in the <u>May 2019 issue of the</u> <u>APWA Reporter magazine.</u>

Oregon Chapter Earns Presidential Award for Excellence

The Oregon Chapter has been selected as a recipient of the 2020 Presidential Award for Chapter Excellence (PACE). National APWA President Bill Spearman notified Oregon Chapter President Mike Bisset of the honor on June 22.

"In recognition of the chapter's impact on APWA's membership, professional development and the advancement of public works, thank you for what your chapter is accomplishing," Spearman said.

"The Oregon Chapter (has) continued building upon the core values of the American Public Works Association, the honored traditions of the Oregon Chapter, and a solid organizational foundation," wrote Immediate Past President Gordon Munro in the introduction to the 2020 PACE nomination. "Due to the efforts of our members, the chapter has seen an influx of new members, provided valued programs for our members and public works

professionals throughout the state, improved networking opportunities, and fostered partnerships that benefit the chapter and its members."

The 2020 PACE marks Oregon's 19th submittal with the chapter successfully earning the award, consecutively, since 2001. Because PWX in New Orleans was cancelled for the safety and health of members, National APWA staff is preparing a recognition ceremony video to be posted online.
